# Our Safety Plan for the next five years

This plan is about improving public safety, reducing the number of emergency incidents and saving lives.



"We are committed to working in collaboration with partner agencies to reduce the risk of accidental fire from occurring and ultimately the protection from harm to adults with needs of care and support, family members or other occupants."

The 4LSAB Fire Safety Development Group (FSDG) is a subgroup of the Four Local Safeguarding Adults Boards (4LSAB) in Hampshire, Southampton, Portsmouth and Isle of Wight.

The 4LSAB FSDG completes a multi-agency review of any fire incident which results in a serious injury or fatality.

The aim of this multi-agency review, is to identify key risk factors and vulnerabilities that the individual(s) involved with the fire incident was experiencing prior to the fire, and to identify if they were known to or in receipt of any support from services within the 4LSAB area.

A thematic review of 39 fire incidents resulting in fatality or serious injury between Jan 2019 and Dec 2021.

Prior to this another thematic review was completed on fire incidents resulting in serious injury or fatality between 2015 and 2018

The multi-agency reviews and the thematic review have enabled partners to have local knowledge and insight into key vulnerabilities and fire risk factors being experienced locally.

79% of individuals had needs of care and support.

56% of individuals were in receipt of care and support services at the time of the incident

18% of incidents had no smoke detection (increase of 11% from the 2015-2018 review) and another 8% had non functioning detection







64% of individuals had smoking as a risk factor (increase of 18% from the

2015-2018 review)



38% of individuals had poor mobility or a physical impairment (increase of 27% from the 2015-2018 review)

54% of individuals identified as having poor mental health as a vulnerability (increase of 28% from the 2015-2018 review)



46% of individuals had alcohol and/or substance misuse (increase of 23% from the 2015-2018 review)




Care and support needs was the most common risk factor relating to individuals within the review (79% of all incidents). This is followed by smoking (64%) and in receipt of care and support services (56%).

79%

Smoking, poor mental health, alcohol/substances and poor mobility/physical impairment have all seen significant increases compared to the previous thematic review.






## 2019 – 2021 Vulnerability and Risk Factors per Local Authority

Local Authority	Total Incidents	Total Incidents %	Population estimate	% of population
Hampshire	21	54%	1.4m	69%
Southampton	9	23%	260k	13%
Portsmouth	7	18%	213k	11%
IOW	2	5%	140k	7%

When viewing incidents by local authority and compared to population, Hampshire and the IOW had a lower percentage of incidents compared to population, whereas Southampton and Portsmouth had more.

## **4LSAB Fire Safety Framework**

The <u>4LSAB Multi Agency Fire Safety Framework</u> has been developed to provide all frontline staff and other professionals with support and guidance for the effective management of fire risks within the home or residential setting.

To ensure an individual's vulnerability to fire is continuously managed, you should consider the use of the 'Person at Risk' Fire Risk Assessment as detailed in Appendix 1 of the framework.

The 'Person at Risk' Fire Risk Assessment is suitable for all individuals regardless of where they are residing (at home; supported housing; care home setting)

The Framework also provides a 'Safe Smoking Risk Assessment' Template

The risk assessment should be completed and reviewed in accordance with an individual's care plan arrangements.

As with all overarching 4LSAB guidance documents, the 4LSAB Multi Agency Fire Safety Framework, should be used as an overarching document for organisations to develop their own internal processes and guidance.



## **4LSAB Fire Safety Framework**

The <u>4LSAB Multi Agency Fire Safety Framework</u> includes an overview of the vulnerability factors identified through the fatality and injury reviews, and a template for a person centred fire risk assessment.

'If one or more of the vulnerability factors are identified, then a person centred fire risk assessment should be completed, and a Safe and Well referral to Hampshire and IOW Fire and Rescue Service should be considered.'

#### **Safe and Well Visits**

A Safe and Well visit is a person-centred home fire safety visit based upon a **person's** health needs, **behavioural** factors and their home **environment**.

The primary aim of a Safe and Well visit is to mitigate and reduce fire risk within the home by trying to influence a change in behaviour that may affect or increase the occupants exposure to increased fire risk.

During a Safe and Well visit we will:

- •Identify any potential fire risks and discuss with the occupier how they can prevent or reduce the risk.
- •Ensure occupants have working smoke alarms, install where necessary, and advise on maintenance and testing.
- •Help put together a household escape plan and identify any mobility issues that may impede on evacuation.
- •Issue fire retardant bedding, furniture throws and nightwear where needed.
- •Give basic advice on topics such as falls prevention and smoking.
